"But without faith it is impossible to please him: for he that cometh to God must believe that he is, and that he is a rewarder of them that diligently seek him" (Hebrews 11:6).

Praying out of desperation, I found myself wrestling with God to get my own way. I was being spirit-driven (single-minded in the outcome) and not spirit-led (united with His outcome). Realizing I was praying against God's will, I began to lay aside the emotional fear of the outcome and allowed God to pray through me. My prayer became one of submission. Thankfully, the Lord so graciously reminded me that He is sovereign in all things.

Before praying, we must be "still" (release, let go) and "know" (recognize He is Sovereign). We surrender preconceived ideas of how God will or should answer and let go, refusing to wrestle with something we cannot change. We recognize God is in control of the plan for His own purpose.

We can be assured God knows the end from the beginning. We will always be successful in praying for our children if we apply what Jesus said:"If ye abide in me, and my words abide in you, ye shall ask what ye will, and it shall be done unto you" (John 15:7). Why Pray? For the sake of our children!

As a mom of two young, beautiful, independent children, I often find myself in awe! If I am totally honest with you, I am also terrified. There are nights my parenting self-evaluation kicks in. Did I speak kindly? Did I encourage good behavior? Did I model those behaviors? Did I listen to them? Was I too distracted? Did I raise my voice? Did I love them enough?

Self-reflection is good, but I am often too hard on myself. Thankfully, God in His grace allows me moments of encouragement where I can see that the

good far outweighs the bad. One of these moments happened in church recently. I was busy chasing after my two-year-old son during altar call, and when I looked up I saw my four-year-old daughter kneeling at the altar, face in her hands, genuinely praying to God. Those thoughts of failure and doubt melted in a moment, and I thanked God for His amazing grace.

One of my favorite scriptures is Philippians 1:6 -"Being confident of this very thing, that He who has begun a good work in you will complete it until the day of Jesus Christ (NKJV)." I always thought Paul was referring to the things we are "doing"for the Lord as being our "good works." Recently though, God dropped a thought into my mind about this verse in relation to my children. They are a representation of the "good works" God has begun in me - literally - when He chose me to be their mother.

This has become a lens God has given me to view my parental self-evaluation. It has challenged me to pray more for and with my children. It is not about how badly I may have failed as a mother, but about a refocusing of Who is really in control. Our challenge is to live according to Proverbs 3:5. "Trust in the LORD with all your heart, and lean not on your own understanding (NKJV)." We must lean on the Word of God! God chose to begin that "good work,"that child, in youand He does not make mistakes.

I can lead my children being confident God is the one helping me to see them come to His perfection. In my moments of weakness He is my strength (Philippians 4:13). In times when I feel I lack the knowledge to make good decisions, He grants wisdom (James 1:5). When I am filled with fear, He reassures me He is our protector (Psalm 91:1-2). So, be encouraged and confident today. God chose you, and what He began in you He will perfect, protect, and see through to the end.
